The South Texas Ecotourism Center is a Cameron County operated nature museum and information center dedicated to the education and preservation of South Texas and the Rio Grande Valley six ecosystems. The Center offers outdoor exhibits with interpretive panels with QR codes, sculpture of native animals, over 48,000 native plants, a look out pavilion with two telescopes and binoculars to view the wildlife at the Center and at the Bahia Grande Unit of the Laguna Atascosa Wildlife Refuge. The Center has brochures on south Texas and Valley nature centers and parks. The Center is located at 501 State Highway 100 in Laguna Vista, Texas. Open 7 days a week from 8 am to 5 pm. STEC Collaborations with Other Groups and Institutions

The South Texas Ecotourism Center collaborates with other institutions in helping to promote its mission and goals to other communities and groups. Staff and volunteers participate with other events and celebrations by setting up an information and education booth with items relating to the Center and setting up at places such the Brownsville Zoo, the Palo Alto National Battle Field, the SPI Birding Center, SPI Convention and Visitors Bureau, various schools in the Valley, regional museums and RV Parks. RGV Pollinator Project

The RGV Pollinator Project is led by a group of Texas Master Naturalists which include Chery Brummett, Alicia Cavazos, and Susan Upton whose goal is to help bring back the Monarch Butterflies to the Valley by germinating and planting the native Zizote Milkweed into the existing pollinator gardens at STEC and other butterfly gardens in the Rio Grande Valley. STEC Staff will work with them in the preparation of the plantings. Working together to discuss the focus and direction of the RGV Pollinator Project will better the goals and programs that the two entities share together. We look forward to have the native Zizote Milkweed grow at the STEC for the betterment and survival of the beautiful Monarch Butterfly.

Seed Paper Made In House from Recycled Paper



STEC Ecosystem Specialist/Educator Mary Shannon McGinley— White has been recycling left over paper that is not used by the Center and recycling it into seed pulp paper. This paper is used for art, letter writing and for journals. The recycled paper is shredded, then soaked and then blended into a pulp. Small seeds , leaves, etc. are added into the pulp as well as color dye. Then it is poured into a frame that has screen. The result is a soft, thick paper that can be reused. The seed themselves can still germinate after the papermaking process and they can sprout when the paper is planted in the soil. Packets of the paper are available for sale at the main office.



San Benito Cultural Heritage Museum Shares Artwork with STEC

The San Benito Cultural Arts Department is partnering with STEC in sharing exhibit pieces that reflect the Centers goals. The Center is showing the "Recent Works" by nationally renowned artist Danville Chadbourne whose colorful exhibition is inspired by nature. It explores how the artist transforms organic materials, found objects and woodwork into poetic, and mesmerizing works of art. The exhibit bridges ecology and art, and is in dialogue with the Rio Grande Valley's biodiversity and natural resources. One of the San Benito Cultural Arts Department continued missions is to create a collaborative environment that promotes, encourages, and shares the narratives of our region. Danville Chadbourne's work adds to the conversation and inspires us to be more curious, and observant of the natural world around us - perhaps it will reveal aspects of ourselves. One of his pieces titled "The Self Selecting Hypothesis" which is made of ceramic, acrylic paint, and Aspen and Ligustrum wood will be shown until July 28th.
