BIRDING NOTES

There are a number of interesting creatures that live in the marshlands, most of them are in the families of herons and rails. Herons are usually large, rather easy to see, and often quite beautiful. Rails, on the other hand, are much smaller, browner, and quite covert. Sneaking around in our wetlands there is a curious creature (of the black lagoon?) known as the Common Gallinule, *Gallinula chloropus*.

Our poor gallinule has an identity crisis. In America they were always known as gallinules but their close cousins in Europe and Asia are called moorhens. American ornithologists eventually bowed to the standardization of the taxonomy and changed our gallinules into moorhens. In 2011 the name Common Moorhen was changed back to Common Gallinule. As usual, the birders were confused, there is no report on how the birds felt about it.

They are medium-sized rail-like birds with rather stubby wings and your first thought on seeing one might well be that that's a funny-looking duck. A strange duck indeed. The bill is conical rather than broad and flat, and those feet are definitely not webbed. They have a glossy black plumage with a little white trim on the flanks, and they wear snazzy red garters. The most striking feature is the red "shield" that covers the upper half of the bill and extends well upward onto the forehead. This the first thing you are likely to notice about them. Not as obvious are their amazing feet. At the ends of their rather long, yellow-green legs are yellow-green feet with enormously long toes.

Our birds are resident here and through the summer they are busy nesting and raising young. They lay eight to fourteen buffy eggs with brown spots. Because the eggs begin to incubate as soon as they are laid, the chicks emerge over a period of as much as two weeks. There are few things more bizarre looking than a young gallinule. Baby ducks are Cute! Baby gallinules – not so much. They are covered with short, black down, except that the covering is thin on the head and shiny patches of skin show through. The wings are short stubs that look severely damaged, the bodies look like fuzzy black ping-pong balls, and all this is balanced on ridiculously long legs with huge feet.

They are precocious and follow mom into the water within minutes of hatching and learn to forage immediately but they still need mom for directions and protection. They feed on greens and seeds, as well as spiders and small insects. They are not very good at flying and it is always humorous to watch one running across the top of the water pumping its wings desperately trying to achieve liftoff acceleration. They are, however, very good at getting around in soft mud and marshy areas. Those big feet are perfect for walking safely on the lightest of vegetation.

If you would like to see some of these curious birds for yourself there is a nice population of them living on South Padre Island and you can safely see our "swimming chickens" from the boardwalk at the Birding and Nature Center there.

As a treat and for comparison I have included a picture of a "Purple Gallinule." They are not common here but are occasionally seen on South Padre Island. They are the same size but most definitely have a purple hue and the red shield on the face becomes a lovely shade of sky blue as it rises to the forehead. (see photos on next page)

November 9th at 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. at the STEC Multipurpose Room. Free admission and popcorn.




